

Exchange Under TEFCA





ASTP defines overall policy and certain governance requirements

RCE provides oversight and governing approach for the Qualified Health Information Networks (QHINs)

QHINs connect directly to each other to facilitate nationwide interoperability

Each QHIN connects Participants, which connect Subparticipants

Participants and Subparticipants connect to each other through TEFCA Exchange

- Participants contract directly with a QHIN and may choose to also provide connectivity to others (Subparticipants), creating an expanded network of networks
- Participants and Subparticipants sign the same Terms of Participation and can generally participate in TEFCA Exchange in the same manner



Draft QTF Version 2.1 Feedback Received

Draft Government Benefits Determination SOP



What is the TEFCA Government Benefits Determination Exchange Purpose?

The Government Benefits Determination Exchange Purpose is one of the six authorized Exchange Purposes under the TEFCA framework. This enables federal, state, local, or tribal government agencies to request and receive health information to make determinations about an individual's eligibility for non-healthcare related government benefits, such as Social Security disability benefits. The exchange of this information is required to be consistent with the HIPAA Privacy Rule and other applicable laws.

- The RCE is seeking feedback on the draft Government Benefits Determination Exchange Purpose Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) and draft Exchange Purposes SOP v4.1, released on August 18, 2025.
- Feedback will be accepted until <u>TOMORROW</u>
 September 17th at 11:59 p.m. ET.

Exchange Purposes (XPs)



- Every transaction that occurs via TEFCA Exchange MUST include the XP Code that represents the reason for why the transaction is being initiated
- Each of the authorized XPs may also have specific use cases that are identified with their own XP Code, such as Social Security Determination
- The XP codes for more specific use cases will begin with the same characters as the broader XP

Authorized XP	XP Code
Government Benefits Determination	T-GOVDTRM
Social Security Determination	T-GOVDTRM-SSD
Access Consent Policy	T-GOVDTRM-ACP



The Exchange Purposes SOP Version 4.0 serves as the reference document for all current XP SOPs.

5 New and Updated FAQs Released!

How does TEFCA address "minimum necessary" requirements under HIPAA?

QHINs, Participants, and Subparticipants are expected to abide by applicable law, including HIPAA. Therefore, organizations must consider their HIPAA compliance obligations when responding to requests that require sharing only the minimum necessary information for the given Exchange Purpose, such as Public Health or Health Care Operations. HIPAA minimum necessary provisions generally do not apply to sharing health information among providers for Treatment or with individuals (or their authorized representatives) for Individual Access Services.



Will the RCE or ASTP have access to electronic personal health information (ePHI) shared via TEFCA?

No. Neither the RCE nor ASTP participate in the exchange of ePHI or have access to data shared among the QHINs. Section 3.2 of the Terms of Participation describes the limited circumstances under which the RCE or ASTP may request Confidential Information to address a specific matter, such as a dispute among QHINs. However, Confidential Information is defined to **exclude** ePHI. QHINs, Participants, and Subparticipants are expected to remove ePHI from information that is shared with ASTP or the RCE.



Who can query for information under the Public Health Exchange Purpose?

Only Initiating Nodes of a Public Health Authority (PHA) or its Delegate may initiate a QHIN Query using the T-PH XP Code, in accordance with applicable law and the Common Agreement. A query may be initiated for any allowable Public Health Exchange Purpose (as defined in Section 2 of the Public Health XP Implementation SOP) or in response to reporting under the Electronic Case Reporting or Electronic Laboratory Reporting use cases.



The Public Health Exchange Purpose Implementation SOP includes a provision on Alternate Uses (Section 5.4) that states "Information transacted under the Public **Health Exchange Purpose MUST NOT be** persisted or used by any Node along the transaction chain that is not the addressed recipient, unless agreed to by the data source or recipient through a specific written agreement or as needed for a required audit as specified in the QTF." Why doesn't the provision require both the data source and the recipient to agree to a third party being able to Use Public Health data transacted via TEFCA?

This provision provides additional protection for Public Health data transacted via TEFCA while allowing Public Health Authorities (PHA) and other TEFCA-connected entities to use third parties to support their data exchange. For example, a health care provider may use a state or local health information exchange to transform data into the specifications required by the PHA to which they are reporting. As a second example, a PHA may contract with an organization that hosts an immunization registry. Such arrangements would be subject to all applicable law, including any federal, state, or local public health and privacy laws.



Are fees allowed in TEFCA?

The Common Agreement prohibits QHIN-to-QHIN fees but does not specify how much QHINs and other TEFCA connectors can charge for their connectivity services. Whether fees are allowed between an initiator and a responder for a query under a given Exchange Purpose is specified in the Exchange Purposes SOP.

In all cases, fees are also subject to applicable law. Responders may not charge fees for queries under the Treatment and Individual Access Services Exchange Purposes.
